Make sure transcript shows proof of graduation.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Finalize list of schools (5-7) and begin to set up official (and unofficial) visits for the fall if you want to sign in the early signing period (November).</li> <li>Remember you can only have one official visit per school and a maximum of five total office visits.
